The curriculum at Broadstone First School is designed to prepare children for a life well lived. Coverage of the national curriculum is organised into modules, linking subjects where appropriate and beneficial. Additional time is built in to enable assessment and review time.

We follow the Read Write Inc Speed Sounds Phonics scheme to ensure appropriate progression and pace for learning to read. This programme is accompanied by the Read Write Inc reading books to provide matched opportunities for practise and application of phonics when reading.

As well as the quality texts that think to our modules and learning, we study class reads that are varied and exciting to enthuse our learners to be avid readers! There are some classics that will always remain as class reads but we also expect new reads to make the cut according to the interests of the learners and the teachers.
