

The children have taken part in a variety of activities with the residents to benefit both residents and children. The aim was to improve children's understanding and awareness of

Dementia and how to positively interact with anyone with this condition.

The children took part in a World Book day event sharing stories together and taking part in some book related activities. We have also had an intergenerational Sports day in which the residents came to School to take part in a range of accessible Sporting activities on the School field. It was supposed to be non-competitive but became more competitive as the morning went on but with a huge amount of enjoyment and laughter from all involved. Our aim is to become a dementia Friendly School as we continue to build the experiences for our children. The next session will be an art workshop followed by the choir visiting a number of homes in the Ferndown area.





Taking our learning outside!

Providing children with rich experiences outside of the classrooms is incredibly important. It secures knowledge that has been taught in school and allows children to see their learning in a new and real context. We know being outdoors has a positive impact on our health and wellbeing.

Reception children visited Blashford Lakes nature reserve. The children took part in pond dipping, meadow sweeping and den building. The children had a wonderful time and were impeccably behaved.



Year 2 had a great trip to Liberty's Owl, Raptor and Reptile Centre. They saw lots of different reptiles including a salmon pink bird-eating tarantula! They also met some birds of prey including a golden eagle called Jerry with wing span!

Year 3 children visited Brownsea Island. The sun shone all day and the children enjoyed developing their understanding of the geographical features of Poole Harbour and making drawings/rubbings of some of the local animals. Lots of island wildlife were spotted including a proud peacock showing off his tail feathers and a beautiful red squirrel. Our budding photographer, James in Year 3, took this stunning photo of a peacock using his own camera.

The children explored why solar panels are constructed to face south at an angle of 30 degrees and learned about how electricity is generated and transported. Tracy from Earth Energy Education has also led workshops with each class to design and make a solar powered toy.

We believe it is important that we support children to become responsible, respectful, and active citizens. We aim to develop pupils' character, giving them qualities they need to flourish in society. Developing pupils' confidence and resilience not only prepares the children for

Year 7 Careers Visit – Butchers Coppice

Employability and Careers Presentation

The education development trust Employability and Careers team came to speak to Year 8. Both presenters are qualified careers advisors and provided the pupils with lots of information and advice about thinking of the future, not only careers choices. The pupils were told that the top five soft skills employers are looking for are: communication (written and verbal), organisation, attention to detail, leadership and the ability to problem solve. So, if you get any opportunity to help your son/daughter practice these skills it would be highly valuable. The pupils were also encouraged to take active steps now to prepare themselves for the future choices they have to make and the careers they may want to explore. Some of these tips are useful now, others are worth remembering when your child is older.

The top tips were:

- Take part in extra-curricular activities.
- Engage in sports/leisure activities.
- Try some volunteering.
- Participate in a Duke of Edinburgh or Princes Trust activity.
- Get some work experience, evening/weekend jobs.
- Try some online courses in areas that are of interest; many are free.

What is a School Standards Board?

School Standards Boards are made up of elected parent governors and appointed community governors. Some boards also have an elected staff governor. The School Standards Boards monitor school standards and support the Senior Leaders to ensure the very highest quality provision for our children. In essence, local governors "champion the school experience for the child, the family and staff".

What does a school governor do?

School governors will fulfil their functions in a variety of ways, including:-

- Contributing to strategic discussions at meetings, to ensure the very best opportunities for all learners.
- Reading reports prior to meetings and asking questions of challenge at the meeting.
- Challenging and supporting Senior Leaders to achieve ambitious strategic priorities and targets for the school.
- Taking on a link governor role with a particular focus, based on your skills and available time, and linking this into occasional school visits.

Our governors will normally attend six meetings a term and probably visit school once or twice during the year to fulfil their function.
