Pupil Premium Strategy 2018-19

We believe that all learners should have access to a high-quality education, irrespective of their background, personal circumstances or prior experiences. Due to their personal circumstances, some learners are considered to be at a disadvantage compared to their peers. As a result, we receive additional funding to ensure that all learners exceed or make at least expected progress. We have clear monitoring and success criterion for each initiative and how this correlates with good outcomes for our learners. Our aim is to raise the attainment and progress of learners in receipt of Pupil Premium so that their performance compares favourably with Non-Pupil Premium peers. We use the grant to enhance and extend our provision to make sure that learners are not disadvantaged in any way. We see pupils as individuals, each with their own challenges, talents and interests. Staff work to identify what might help each pupil make the next steps in their learning, whether they are performing below, at, or above expectations. We focus on providing targeted support for under-performing pupils during curriculum time (as well as providing learning support outside of normal school hours). We seek out strategies best suited to addressing individual needs, rather than simply fitting pupils into existing support strategies. Nationally, statistics show a gap between the attainment and progress of some groups of pupils including those in receipt of Free School Meals (FSM) and their peers.

In March 2018 the Government announced that free school meals would only be available to children in KS2 whose families have a net income of £7400 or under, effective from 1 April 2018. If your child was previously entitled to free school meals but is no longer, they will still receive pupil premium based on the 'Ever 6' qualification (a pupil who has ever had free school meals in the past six years). Prior to April 2018, children qualified for free school meals – and accordingly pupil premium – if you received any of the following benefits:

- Income support
- Income-based jobseekers' allowance
- Income-related employment and support allowance
- Support under Part IV of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of state pension credit
- Child tax credit, provided that you are not also entitled to working tax credit and have an annual gross income of £16,190 or less



These benefits have now been rolled into a single benefit, called Universal Credit. From April 2018, free school meals and pupil premium will only be allocated to pupils with a family income under £7400 (net) per year. Since September 2014, all children in Reception and Years 1 and 2 have qualified for free school meals, regardless of their family income, but only the children who would qualify for free meals under the above income-based criteria will receive the pupil premium.

Pupil Premium Guarantee

We have established a Pupil Premium Guarantee at Broadstone First School. This financial guarantee is immediately available to all families in receipt of Pupil Premium. Our Guarantee for every qualifying student will include:

1. £125 per child per academic year to go towards the cost of uniform, equipment, residential and day trips. This will be held by the Finance Manager but can be claimed at any time by parents/carers by contacting school. All such requests will be treated with the strictest confidence.
2. Guaranteed access to Pastoral Care and Counselling support if necessary.
3. Guaranteed access to 'in house' interventions and outside events as appropriate.
4. Guaranteed access, where required, to 1:1 support or small group work for English and/or Maths
5. Guaranteed access to bespoke individual support from our inclusion team focussing on areas such as confidence building and time management

Our Funding

For the academic year 2018-2019 we will receive £37060 in pupil premium funding. We have taken advice and guidance from the Education Endowment Foundation and the New Primary School Guide to the Pupil Premium with effective strategies, Ofsted checklist and 15 point success plan as well as case studies.
